


Suddenly, Viru fell down bowing at Trilokchand's feet, "Please forgive me. The fight you had with my father...."

Trilokchand joined his hands and with lot of respect told the scholar, "I have






Introspect Yourself!


Subhadra's mother-in-law always derided her. She would criticize the Jain religion. Subhadra would quietly bear such treatment.



They have never worried about anything. So, then why do you need to get into all this?"


