"There must be a big offer, otherwise Harry wouldn't do something like this!" another friend said.

"Seriously. someone who has never seen any religious serials in his life, someone who doesn't even know if the golden deer was in the Ramayana or the Mahabharata, and today he's going to write a mythological script! Too much!" a third friend added.

"Sure, sir. I won't disappoint you!" Harry responded, shaking the director's hand.


The fact that a young guy had come to Mumbai to write a script on Lord Krishna was impressive to him. However, to test Harry, the director said,

After reaching his room, he looked at all the topics. The first scene was "Govardhan Mountain." Harry searched. He read that Lord Krishna had lifted up the Govardhan Mountain with just his pinky finger.

Harry thought, 'How can someone lift an entire mountain on his pinky finger? And why would he do that? Is this really true?'



Harry Googled, "Is the story of Shree Krishna and Govardhan Mountain true?" And what he read gave him a completely logical answer to this question.

Questioner: Is the story of lifting the Govardhan Mountain with his pinky finger true or a myth?

Krishna's Govardhan – Cows' Vardhan (Increase in Population)!

Dadashri: During the time of Lord Krishna, there was a significant increase in violence. So what did Lord Krishna do? He lifted the Govardhan Mountain with one finger. Now, lifting the Govardhan Mountain with one finger is the literal meaning. But people did not understand the subtle meaning. Govardhan means to increase the

population of cows. He did everything necessary for govardhan and goraksha (protection of cows). This is because the primary livelihood of the people of Hindustan depended on this. So, when violence increases significantly, leave everything else and prioritize protecting this first. And as for the carnivorous animals, we don't need to do anything for them. These animals are anyways carnivorous. You don't need to do anything for them. No one kills them, and they can't be eaten either! Who would eat a cat? Who would eat a dog? No one eats them and no

one can eat them either. So, govardhan and goraksha, these are the two things to be prioritized first.

There should be many efforts made for govardhan. What Lord Krishna did by lifting Govardhan on one finger was a very noble act! He established govardhan all over and started many cow shelters. He ensured that thousands of cows would be nurtured. He emphasized these two things: govardhan and goraksha. By providing them protection, the violence against them stopped. And then, milk, ghee, and all such things became available everywhere! Therefore, instead of just saving cows, it is crucial to increase the population of cows.

There are this many benefits to keeping cows; there are this many benefits in cow milk, and there are this many benefits in cow ghee. All this should be openly discussed, and while it may not be a mandatory thing, it should be explained to people, and there should be a promotion of cows in every village so that the cow population increases significantly. Earlier, they used to maintain cow shelters everywhere, keeping thousands of cows. So, there is a need to increase the number of cows. Now, the cow population is not increasing. But we cannot force this on anyone. However, if we don't speak up, it would be a sin.

Questioner: We don't free the cows, but we do prevent them from going (to the slaughterhouse).

Dadashri: Yes, stop them from going. Explain to their owners not to do this. Right now, focus on govardhan and goraksha; these two should be prioritized first. Everything else is secondary! Once these are accomplished, then move on to other things.

That is why Lord Krishna emphasized govardhan and goraksha. And the people who performed govardhan were the gops and gopis. Gop means those who take care of cows!

Questioner: This concept of govardhan is entirely new to me.

Dadashri: Yes, there are indeed many such things. But if they are explained in detail, then it will be beneficial. Otherwise, there are many such stories, and they are all true. But people took them literally. They say, "He lifted the Govardhan Mountain." Then the foreign scientists say, "This is nonsense. How could someone lift a mountain? If he could lift it, then why didn't he lift the Himalayas? And why did he die from the mere strike of an arrow?" But it wasn't like that.

He did govardhan in a very beautiful way, because at that time, violence had increased significantly.

Harry really liked what he read.

He wrote the first scene immediately. On one side, he kept the metaphor of Lord Krishna lifting the Govardhan Mountain with his pinky finger, and on the other side, he wrote the script based on its true meaning.

"Phew! The first scene is done. Let's see, what should I write about next!" Harry started researching the details of the next scene given by the director.

"Oh child, run away. If our master wakes up, he will kill you!"

But why would Kanudo listen? He stubbornly wakes up the serpent.

Kaliya becomes furious, turning red with anger. He approaches Krishna to kill him. But the young Kanudo fights the serpent and defeats him, then dances on his head.

Seeing all this, Kanuda's friends are left astonished on the riverbank. The entire village gathers to witness the scene. Eventually, the serpent leaves the river, and the water of the Yamuna River becomes pure again.

Harry read this story twice. Then a thought occurred to him.

'Oh, come on! This story doesn't seem true! How could a small boy fight a serpent in the river and dance on such a huge serpent's head?'

Dadashri: Five thousand years ago, the story of Kaliya the serpent was depicted as a metaphor. Krishna actually did not defeat the serpent Kaliya. The serpent represents the anger that arises in you, the anger that makes you frustrated.

To subdue a snake is the work of a snake charmer, so what does Lord Krishna have to do with it? Why would Lord Krishna need to subdue a snake? Didn't he know a snake charmer?

But people do not understand this and continue to take the metaphor literally. Whenever a serpent is defeated, Lord Krishna is present there. Here, the serpent represents anger. When you subdue your anger, you become like Krishna. The one who destroys his karma is Krishna!

Harry became deeply absorbed in thought. As he pondered, he moved closer to the window.

"I see! Kaliya the serpent, is actually a symbol of anger. He doesn't reside in the Yamuna River, but inside each of us. He poisons our lives and relationships. Gopi does not refer to any woman. The term Gop refers to a person who cares for and protects cows, and that's how the name Gopi came to be.

The word Radha is derived from the word Radh. The effort to become one with the divine is called Radh, which means worship or devotion. Where there is the worship of the Lord, meaning where there is Radha, there Krishna will surely be present!





Lord Shree Krishna's Sudarshan Chakra was not a weapon. Instead, it symbolized the Samyak Darshan (Right Vision of 'I am pure Soul') that Lord Shree Krishna received from Lord Neminath, who was his paternal cousin and a Tirthankar Lord. When one realizes that the one with a name and a body is not the true Self, all wrong beliefs shatter, and the right belief, 'I am pure Soul' takes its place. This right belief is what is known as Samyak Darshan.

Harry became curious about what the scriptures have written about Shree Krishna. He read a book on the subject and learned something entirely new.


Lord Shree Krishna was married, but he had great reverence for all celibates and renunciates!

"Oh, so you are also a celibate?" Harry asked.


"Yes, but without the queens!" the man replied with a laugh.
